With comprehensive cataloguing and detailed records, students can easily navigate a user-friendly index, Web-OPAC, to find what they need. To enhance user experience, the library utilizes an RFID system for easy circulation and footfall counting, making it more efficient for students and staff to access resources.

Additionally, the Dept. libraries are focused on specific disciplines like Pharmaceutical Technology, Law, Nursing, Allied Health Sciences and Biotechnology. Together, the Central Library and these departmental libraries offer an extensive array of resources. The integrated library system used at Brainware University Library, is KOHA (version 20.11), while the DSpace institutional repository software has been employed to manage and preserve the academic and research outputs of the University.

The Calcutta Municipal Gazette, edited by Amal Home, was published by the then Calcutta Municipal Corporation in the memory of Rabindranath on 13th September, 1941. On August 7 of 1941 Gurudev Rabindranath Tagore passed away. The Gazette was published on the life events and memoir of Rabindranath Tagore. There were many photographs and documents of Rabindranath in that Gazette. Also, many scholars wrote about Rabindranath in that Gazette. The Gazette contained many letters written by Rabindranath and many photographs with autographs of Tagore. Some of the paintings of Rabindranath Tagore were published in it. In 1932, the University of Calcutta awarded Honourary Doctoral Degree of Literature to Rabindranath Tagore. The Gazette also enriched with many rare photographs of Rabindranath Tagore's family and family members.

Brinware University Library is proud to have a copy of this rare Gazette in their Rare and Valuable Collections.



Knowledge Spotlight

Memorial Plaque of Pandit Ishwar Chandra Vidyasagar at Nimtala 'Maha Shmashana'

Nimtala Crematorium also known as Nimtala Burning Ghat is located between Biddon Street and Stand Road in Kolkata on the bank of Ganges. There is a plaque commemorating the great Bengali scholar, educationist, social reformer and the progenitor of "Barno Porichoy", Ishwar Chandra Vidyasahar (26th September, 1820-29th July, 1891).

The contribution of Pandit Ishwar Chandra Vidyasagar especially in the world of Bengali language is unquestionable. Vidyasagar was born on 26 September 1820 in Birsingha village of the then Hooghly district (which is now in West Midnapore). He has done many scholarly works on Bengali language and literature, and many revolutionary works for the Bengali society. After completing his primary education in the village, he came to Calcutta with his father Thakur Das Bandopadhyay for higher education. "Barno Porichoy" is his creation. Ishwar Chandra Vidyasagar remains a neglected personality to the then Bengalis and Bengali society. The Bengali society and the "Brahmo" society at that time insulted him. He took the initiative for the first widow remarriage in Bengal and the groom was his own son, Narayan Chandra Bandopadhyay, and the bride was a Bengali Widow. Vidyasagar arranged this marriage to set an example to the society. For this, his family rejected all good relations with him. Not only his family but the society also isolated him after this incident. Even his relationship with his son was severed. His son Narayan Chandra Bandopadhyay renounced all ties with Vidyasagar. Despite this, Vidyasagar was not distracted from his duty to the society and his thought of formation of an educated Bengali society. In Later life, when Vidyasagar fell ill and became bed-ridden, his son held Bidyasagara's feet and begged for forgiveness. Vidyasagar was so kindhearted that he forgave his son. This great personality left this eternal world on 29th July 1891. Even after his death, the society has started to think that "Apad" (bad man) was gone and did not stop insulting him.

Vidyasagar was cremated at Nimtala "Maha Shasnan". A memorial plaque was founded after 129 years of Vidyasagar's death, in 2020, by the Indian Association (Bharat Sova). Vidyasagar was the founding member of Indian Association. The memorial plaque was placed on a tomb right next to the statue of "Biswa Kabi" Rabindranath Tagore.



The memorial plaque should have been placed much earlier but, I personally have doubt that not many people can identify him by looking at that plaque. If you ever visit this place, stand in front of this plaque and remember that great Indian philanthropist, who fought till his last breath for those who were socially marginalized.



This book offers a meticulous catalogue of plants, providing key details such as biological names, family classifications, descriptions of phytoconstituents, and pharmacological uses. For students, researchers, and botanical enthusiasts, this guide presents an in-depth look at the therapeutic potential of a diverse range of plants. One of the book's standout qualities is its structured and thorough approach. Each plant entry includes not only taxonomic information but also specific insights into the chemical constituents responsible for the plant's medicinal effects. This scientific depth, particularly concerning phytoconstituents, makes the book highly valuable for those studying pharmacognosy or working in fields like herbal medicine and natural product research.

I would like to thank specially to the library of Brainware University for taking the initiatives to publish the book which created a significant academic and practical relevance.

The pharmacological applications listed for each plant add further value, making the book useful beyond simple identification or botanical study. Readers can see the clinical and therapeutic implications of these plants, including their potential uses for conditions such as inflammation, microbial infections, and antioxidant support. This combination of botanical information and pharmacological relevance elevates the book as both a scientific resource and an educational tool.

While the book is highly informative and thoughtfully organized, some printing issues have been noted, affecting the presentation of information on certain plants. These inconsistencies, though minor, can be distracting for readers seeking clear and uninterrupted data. For instance, some sections may have minor misprints or formatting errors, which could be clarified in future editions. Although these issues do not significantly detract from the content's value, they do impact the reader's overall experience. Despite this drawback, "A Therapeutic Garden" remains an accessible and comprehensive guide, making complex scientific information available in a straightforward and engaging format. The language is clear, allowing even common readers of various backgrounds to benefit from the wealth of information on medicinal plants. Additionally, "A Therapeutic Garden" is a rich and informative text that highlights the medicinal diversity within Brainware University medicinal garden. Despite minor printing issues, the book is an essential addition to the library of anyone interested in plant-based medicine, pharmacognosy, or botany. It stands out as both a practical resource and an inspiring reminder of nature's therapeutic potential.
