মহর্ষি কৃষ্ণদ্বৈপায়ন বেদব্যাস বিরচিত

মহাভারত

কালীপ্রসন্ন সিংহ কর্তৃক বাঙলা ভাষায় অনুবাদিত

মহাভারত শুধু একটি ধর্মগ্রন্থ বা কাব্য নয়, বরং প্রাচীন ভারতের সমাজ, রাজনীতি, নীতি, ধর্ম, আচরণ ও মানবজীবনের প্রায় সব দিকের একটি বিশাল ভাণ্ডার। এতে মানুষের চরিত্র, নৈতিক সংকট, কর্তব্যবোধ এবং জীবনের বিভিন্ন পরিস্থিতিতে করণীয় সম্পর্কে গভীর শিক্ষা দেওয়া হয়েছে। গ্রন্থটি এত বিস্তৃত ও জটিল যে সাধারণ মানুষের পক্ষে সরাসরি সংস্কৃত ভাষায় পুরোপুরি বোঝা কঠিন। তাই বিভিন্ন পণ্ডিত এটি সহজ ভাষায় অনুবাদ ও ব্যাখ্যা করার চেষ্টা করেছেন, যাতে সাধারণ মানুষও এর শিক্ষা গ্রহণ করতে পারে। তবে অনুবাদের সময় মূল ভাব বজায় রাখা এবং অতিরিক্ত ব্যাখ্যা বা বিকৃতি এড়ানো গুরুত্বপূর্ণ।

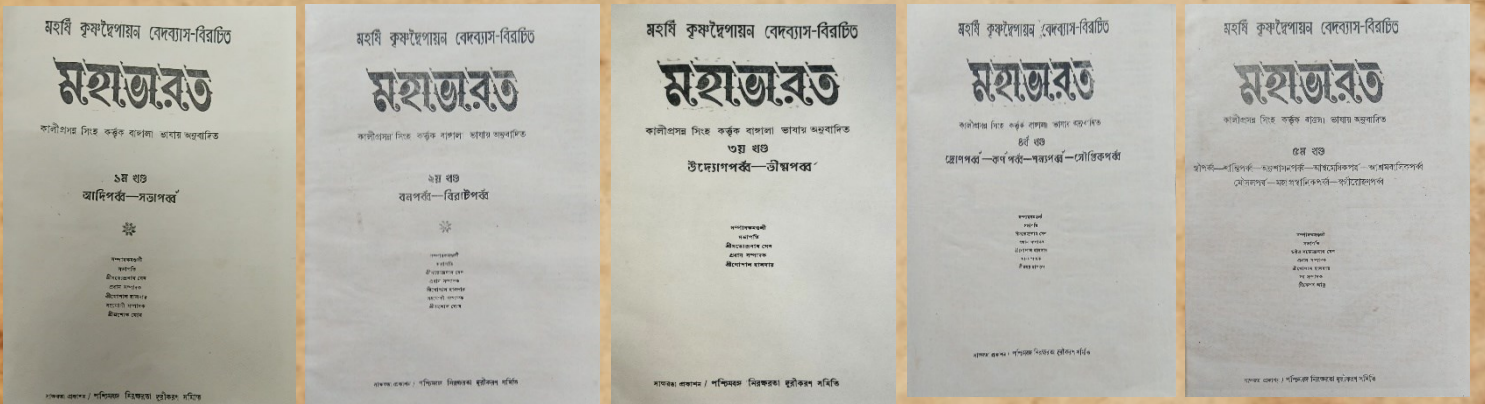
একটি যুগান্তকারী সৃষ্টি: ঊনবিংশ শতাব্দীর মাঝামাঝি সময়ে রচিত, বহুমুখী প্রতিভার অধিকারী লেখক ও সমাজহিতৈষী কালীপ্রসন্ন সিংহ কর্তৃক এই গদ্য রূপান্তরটি এখনও পর্যন্ত মূল সংস্কৃত থেকে সম্পূর্ণ মহাকাব্যের সবচেয়ে সুনির্দিষ্ট, প্রামাণিক এবং বহুল পঠিত বাংলা অনুবাদ হিসেবে গণ্য হয়।

সাংস্কৃতিক সংরক্ষণ: এই গ্রন্থটি (বইটি) বিশেষভাবে অনন্য, কারণ এটি পশ্চিমবঙ্গে নিরক্ষরতা দূরীকরণ এবং সাধারণ মানুষের মধ্যে ধ্রুপদী সাহিত্য ছড়িয়ে দেওয়ার লক্ষ্যে একটি সরকারি সামাজিক উদ্যোগের অধীনে প্রকাশিত হয়েছিল। ব্রেনওয়ার্ড ইউনিভার্সিটি লাইব্রেরি (Brainware University Library) বর্তমানে বিশ্ববিদ্যালয়ের 'দুর্লভ এবং মূল্যবান সংগ্রহ' (Rare and Valuable Collections)-এর অধীনে এই বইটির মোট ৫টি খণ্ডই সংরক্ষণ করছে।

কালীপ্রসন্ন সিংহ (২৩ ফেব্রুয়ারি ১৮৪০ - ২৪ জুলাই ১৮৭০ মতান্তরে ১৮৭১) ছিলেন একজন ভারতীয় বাঙালি লেখক ও সমাজসেবক। বাংলা সাহিত্যে তাঁর দুই অমর অবদানসমূহের জন্য চিরস্মরণীয় হয়ে আছেন। সেগুলো হল, বৃহত্তম মহাকাব্য মহাভারতের বাংলা অনুবাদ এবং তাঁর বই ‘ছতোম প্যাঁচার নকশা’। ঊনবিংশ শতকের বাংলা-সাহিত্য আন্দোলনের তিনি অন্যতম একজন পৃষ্ঠপোষক ছিলেন। মাত্র ঊনত্রিশ বছরের জীবনে তিনি সাহিত্য ও সমাজের উন্নয়নের জন্য অসংখ্য কাজ করেছেন। তিনি বিধবা বিবাহের একজন সমর্থক ছিলেন। বহু বিধবা দুখিনীর জীবন পরিবর্তন এর জন্য তিনি অকাতরে দান করেছেন। তিনি ‘ঈশ্বরচন্দ্র বিদ্যাসাগরের’ প্রিয় ছাত্র ছিলেন।

কালীপ্রসন্ন সিংহ এই গ্রন্থটিতে উল্লেখ করেছেন যে মহাভারতের কাহিনির মধ্যে নীতিশিক্ষা, ধর্মচিন্তা ও জীবনের বাস্তব অভিজ্ঞতার এমন সমন্বয় আছে যা সব যুগেই প্রাসঙ্গিক। এটি মানুষের চরিত্র গঠন, বিচারবুদ্ধি উন্নয়ন এবং সঠিক সিদ্ধান্ত নিতে সাহায্য করে।

শেষাংশে বলা হয়েছে, পাঠকের উচিত মনোযোগ দিয়ে মহাভারত পাঠ করা—তাহলেই এর প্রকৃত অর্থ ও গভীরতা উপলব্ধি করা সম্ভব।

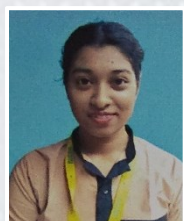

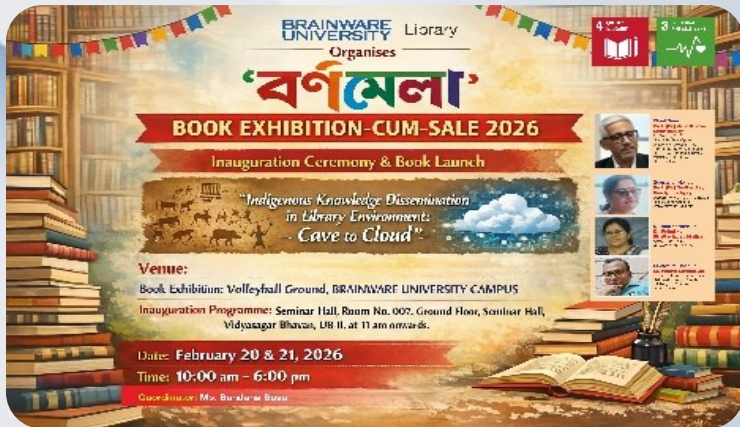

Brainware University hosted the Book Exhibition cum Sale 2026, transforming the campus into a vibrant hub of knowledge and discovery.

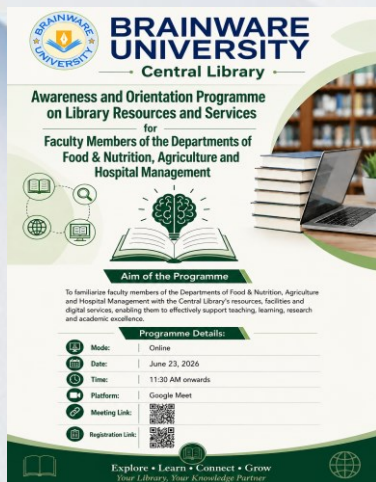

Health Economics: A Key to Sustainable Healthcare



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Health economics that applies economic principles in health care is a specialized branch of economics. It focuses on the efficient allocation and utilization of limited healthcare resources to maximize health outcomes for individuals and communities. With increasing healthcare costs, population growth, and rapid technological advancements, health economics has become an essential component of healthcare planning, financing, and policy development. It supports evidence-based decision-making and ensures that healthcare resources are used efficiently, equitably, and sustainably.

Health economics recognizes that health is both a social and an economic asset. A healthy population contributes to higher productivity, improved quality of life, and national economic growth. Conversely, poor health leads to increased healthcare expenditure, reduced workforce productivity, and financial hardship for families and governments. These approaches support governments and healthcare providers in deciding which health programs to focus on and ensure the effective use of money and human efforts.

Another key idea is fairness, which makes sure that everyone, regardless of their income, gender, religion, or where they live, can access the healthcare they need. Lowering differences in healthcare access by improving facilities, making treatment affordable, and sharing resources fairly is important for justice and better health for all people.

Financing healthcare is a vital part of health economics. In India, healthcare funding comes from both public and private sources, like government taxes, social insurance, private insurance, employer plans, charitable donations, and money spent by families. Good financial systems help people get the care they need, lessen the cost on families and make health care systems more lasting.

Nurses role in implementing the principles of health economics is very crucial. Through health education, disease prevention, infection control, rational use of medicines, and efficient utilization of healthcare resources, nurses contribute to reducing unnecessary healthcare costs while improving patient outcomes. They also educate patients about government health schemes and health insurance, participate in quality improvement programmes, and support effective healthcare management.

Despite remarkable progress, healthcare systems continue to face challenges such as increasing treatment costs, unequal access to healthcare services, shortage of skilled healthcare professionals, and growing demand for advanced medical technologies. Addressing these challenges requires evidence-based policymaking, stronger primary healthcare systems, digital health innovations, and increased public investment in health. Health economics provides the necessary framework for balancing limited resources with expanding healthcare needs.

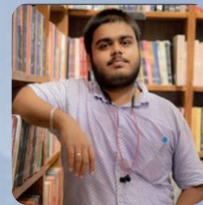

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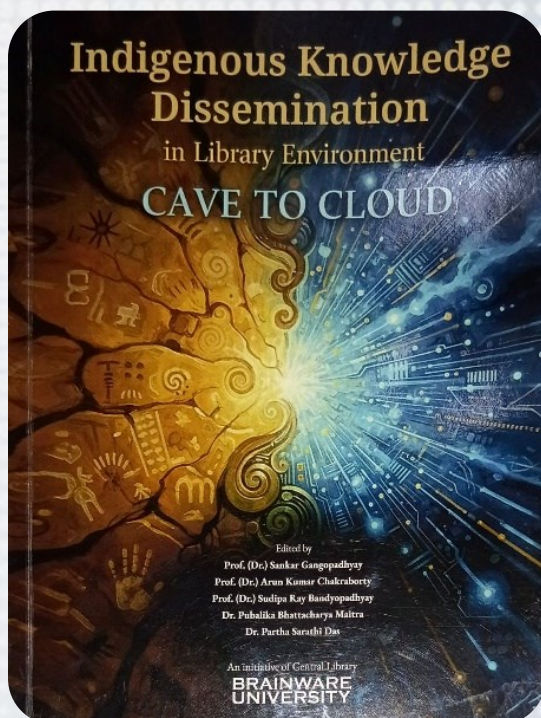
